Our treasurer reported that the club was in the black last month.


The DGD Gazette was reviewed and changes noted.

GOLD PROSPECTING BASICS

Small Placer Equipment, Its Applications and Abilities

This being the section of the Gazette called Prospecting Basics, what is more basic then which machine to use in certain environments. Hopefully this will be a nice refresher for the experienced gold prospector and a good lesson for the beginner.


Sluice: Sluices are long, narrow "boxes" that water passes through when put in a creek or stream. Sluicing is a method of separating and recovering gold from the placer gravel by the use of running water. Gold is caught or trapped by riffles. Of-

ten small diversion dams are built to force as much water through the as possible. The operator must be sure to keep the tailings cleaned away at the downstream end of the sluice so the water flow is maintained and the bottom of the sluice isn't lifted up with debris causing the loss of the optimum angle and rate of flow. A good rule of thumb is to set your sluice at a grade of one inch per foot of drop.




Drywasher: The drywasher is basically a short, waterless sluice. It separates gold from sand by pulsations of air through a porous medium. The gold gravitates down to the canvas and is held by the riffles, while the waste passes over the riffles

and out of the machine. Drywashers always are most effective when the material being processed is as dry as possible which is typical of the soils of southern Arizona in the heat of the summer. They are recommended when the water sources are limited or unavailable. It is recommended that pay dirt is run through the machine twice to maximize the chances of recovering gold. Lots of the people find that going over drywasher tailings with gold detector when the operation is broken down can lead to the discovery of nuggets.



tive in situations where a recirculation system can be set up either through a series of tanks or by lining holes in the ground by which to collect water. The problem with recirculating systems is the fact that it fills up with tailings and must be emptied on a regular basis. It is best to keep the water as clean as possible, if the water becomes very dirty it can actually put the gold particles back into suspension causing them to be lost.



Trommel: A trommel is a rotating cylinder with many holes of a given size, the holes act as a classifier, letting only the material smaller than the holes fall through while the rest of the substrates flow on out the other end of the trommel. Trom-

mels are great for working the high banks and alluvial areas. If the pay dirt is compact or much consolidated trommels are useful in breaking it down to be sluiced. There are 2 methods by which the broken down, classified material is concentrated; one is by feeding it into a sluice, the other is through a reverse helix screw to push the heavier material through the barrel surrounding the classifying screen to the top of the trommel for recovery.



Rocker Boxes: Popular in the old mining camps because of their simplicity, rocker boxes (cradles) are easy to make from

lumber. They can be used with a limited water supply, often no more than a large puddle will suffice. They consist of 3 parts; the body which acts as a sluice, a classifying screen (often made of punch plate) and an apron. The material is classified through the screen into the inclined apron with a low spot or sag to catch the black sands. The riffles in the sluice section catch the remaining gold. It is best to set the rocker box up so the tailings flow off the without sliding back under the front rocker causing the box to tip backward and clogging up the sluice section.

Book Review: Modern Metal Detectors

By Charles Garrett

Charles Garrett has been well known in the detecting and prospecting field since the mid 1950's with his advancements in detector technology. About 40 years ago he and Roy Lagal developed the very efficient pan the Garrett Gravity Trap which has now become standard in the industry from amateur prospector to professional miner and geologist. This book is a basic guide and recommended reading for everyone interested in detecting. It gives advice on purchasing detectors as well as how and where to search. Originally published in 1985 and revived since then it is still in print and available through Amazon.com, Google Books and at the Gold Shows.

Southwest Mining Towns

Mogollon, New Mexico

An old mining town further east then the towns I have been telling of, one can't ignore Mogollon, New Mexico when speaking of these matters. If someone has the time to take a day trip or take a 3 day weekend camping in a cooler climate Mogollon is a great place to go see.

In the late 1860 cavalry soldier, James Cooney, made a discovery of a high grade gold seam in what is now Mineral Creek. At the end of his enlistment he returned to mine the deposit and founding the town which bore his name. Although he was run out of the area by Apache he returned in 1878, his mining activity lead to a great increase in prospecting in the area.

In 1880 after leaving the reservation Chief Victorio's band of Apache moved into the area raiding and stealing cattle. One of the are settlers, John Keller, in the area grew tired of the raids baited and attacked a group of the Apache raiders killing several, one of them was chief Victorio's favorite son-in-law Toribio (who the local settlers called Trouble). This killing greatly enraged and set forth to drive all the settlers and miners out of the area. During the attacks in the San Francisco river (Frisco) Valley 41 settlers and miners were killed. Many of the settlers made their way to the fort at Alma also known as Roberts Cabin giving them the chance to survive. Of the 21 people who made it to the fort only One was killed when he poked his head up to long. James Cooney was killed while traveling to Fort Bayard near Silver City to alert the troops for assistance.

After the Apache raids ceased. Lots of deposits in Silver Creek were discovered, the largest of which was to become the Little Fannie Mine bringing about the establishment of Mogollon in 1889. The post office was established in 1890 as well as the jail, within 2 years a school was opened. By 1909 the town's population rose to 2000 supporting 5 saloons, two restaurants, 4 general stores, two hotels and several brothels. There was a constant train of freight wagons from Silver City, some of which consisted of four wagons being pulled by fifty mules.

The heavy traffic from Silver City lead to the rise in population of the towns of Gila, Cliff, Glenwood and Alma New Mexico. When flood waters were high during heavy monsoons and spring runoff the Gila river between Gila and Cliff would become impassable leading to the construction of "Salars Ferry" by W.E. "Pop" Salars.

There were several fires that swept through the town dating to 1904, 1910, 1915 and 1942 and large floods in 1910, 1015 and 1942 bringing devastation to the town. As late as September 2013 flooding stranded 18 people in Mogollon a year after a huge forest fire swept through the area. With the rise of technology and World War I the town's population diminished to 1500 in the late teens ultimately dropping to around two hundred in the 30's. A small boom occurred in the late 30's when demand for gold rose again but diminished with the onset of World War II.

In 1973 the spaghetti western, "My Name is Nobody", with Henry Fonda and Terrance Hill was filmed in Mogollon causing a great disruption in the town. Without letting any of the residents know the filming company covered the paved road with dirt and put tarps over several cars and trucks to hide them during filming. They also built a 'general store' building and saloon for the filming which still stand today.

The road to Mogollon can be treacherous as it decreases to 1 lane in 2 directions with a drop off on one side and a rocky cliff, but seeing the town and experiencing the cool summer air make it well worth the trip.
