




Gardner Canyon Campsite

Outing Director's Report: October Overnight Outing

Preparations for our October annual overnight outing started on Wednesday October 8 with several board members reserving our camping area. Ralph arrived with supples on Friday, October 10, and approximately 15 members showed up by Friday evening to set up their camping and prospecting equipment and to attend the crock pot cook-off. Outing Director's Report: Pilgrim's Pride NOV 8

We met at 8am at the Mile Post 7 location on Arivaca Road and then caravanned to the detector hunt site. We had 34 members and guests detect for 24 targets with prizes of gold nuggets, \$2 bills and \$1 coins. The detector hunt was a success and all targets were found.



Afterwards some members headed to the Snoozin claims with President Ralph Montaño. Grady Dees and I, along with several other members, went to the Pilgrims Pride claims and used dry washers and recirculating setups. I spent some time metal detecting and discovered a very nice specimen on the claim (p.14) while other members were finding gold while

processing their material.

I loaded up and drove over to the Snoozin claims and found Joe and Becky Marihugh, David Fuller, and other members running their recirculation equipment and finding gold.

Members started leaving around 3-4 PM. The weather was perfect and the outing was a success. Next outing is Sunday, December 7, at the Placer Pond claims in Greaterville.

Members Meeting Minutes: October 7, 2025

- Ralph Montaño convened the meeting at 6 PM; opened with the Pledge of Allegiance; introduced new members and guests; asked who was celebrating October birthdays and anniversaries; asked who needed to be included in the MASH report.
- Outing Director Darrell Marihugh discussed the fall outing, October 10-12 at the Hope claims. Members should meet at the usual club camping spot along Kentucky Camp Road. Chili cook-off and movie (Tombstone) on Friday night. The detector hunt will be start at 8:00 AM Saturday. After the hunt, members may proceed to the claims or explore the area. The cookout will start around noon on Saturday. The raffle for gold nuggets, gift cards, and prospecting equipment will follow. Ralph provided directions to the Club camping spot near Kentucky Camp.
- · Claims Director Hank Bassaraba provided a report regarding the approval of the Forest Service Notice of Intent (NOI) application for the Hope claims. Hank reported that in addition to the basic Forest Service requirements, specific items relating to the Hope claims include: (1) cutting down trees is not permitted to protect bird nesting habitat for Federal endangered species, (2) if frogs or egg masses are present within water sources, avoid disturbing that section of the water body and draw water from a different location whenever feasible, (3) if equipment makes contact with water, disinfect equipment with a mild bleach solution between different water sources to prevent the spread of amphibian pathogens, and (4) minimize trampling stream banks and riparian vegetation.
- Hank concluded the presentation by noting the Forest Services previous concerns about protecting historic and archaeological sites. Hank indicated the Forest Service will provide additional information about the protection of two historic sites specific to the Hope Claims. The Forest Service will be issuing NOI Approval Letters for members to have while working on the Club's National Forest claims and club members will be required to also carry DGD issued ID's when working our claims. Ralph reiterated the importance of burying your prospect holes when you leave and to follow club, Forest Service, and BLM rules and to be positive and respectful when interacting with Forest Service or BLM staff.
- Ralph presented the Pioneer Award to David Salars for his long term service to Desert Gold Diggers as the past president, board member, and volunteering for other numerous positions in the club since 1993.

Gold Achieves Record Market Valuation

appreciation and asked that Desert Gold Diggers return again in 2026.

Did you know that gold is now the world's first global asset to have a \$30 trillion market valuation? The yellow metal has enjoyed a meteoric ascent this year, adding approximately \$11 trillion in valuation. Gold prices have soared more than 60 percent to an all time high of \$4,300 per ounce on the COMEX division of the New York MercantileExchange.

In 2025, gold has outperformed every other asset class, including cryptocurrencies. Gold is also worth more than some of the riches companies combined, including Nvidia (\$4.3 trillion), Microsoft (\$3.8 trillion), and Alphabet (\$3 trillion).

The gold market can be volatile—gold prices suffered their sharpest singe-session selloff by declining more than 5 percent on October 21; however, despite the sellout, prices are still up by more than 56 percent this year. Looking ahead, 12-month forecasts suggest gold prices will stay firmly above \$4000 with some analysts suggest gold will be between \$4,800 and \$5,200 per ounce next year.

Conversely, some analysts suggest that after the sharp rally in 2025, the market will probably have to consolidate and there will be some better entry opportunities. Regardless, most agree in the longer term, there is further upside potential for gold due to tight supply and increased investor interest.
